For this October article, we present the interview with Norbert Kwisanga and Hazira Ghazali, who were selected as valedictorian and salutatorian due to their excellent grades, for the 2021 commencement.

Q1.Please, introduce yourself.

Norbert: My name is Norbert KWISANGA, I'm a Rwandan citizen, and recently graduated from the Master of Urban Administration and Planning at the ISUS. Currently, I am an employee of the City of Kigali in the department of Urban Planning and construction.

Hazirah: I usually introduce myself as Hazirah. I have been working with Kuala Lumpur City Hall for 7 years now. Most of my service is communications management and networking for Kuala Lumpur City internationally. Before my studies in ISUS, I was appointed as the Head of International Training for 9 months at the Kuala Lumpur Regional Training Center. After a year of study leave, I returned as the Head of Compliance Unit at the Integrity Department for 7 months, after that I was called once again to serve as Special Officer for the 13th Mayor of Kuala Lumpur.

Q2. First of all, congratulations on your graduation! How do you feel about that?

Norbert: Thank you for your congratulations! I am really happy and excited to graduate from MUAP. I have been waiting for this event patiently; and it is a great pride for me, my family, and friends to see my graduation happening.

Hazirah: Thank you very much. I still cannot believe that my friends and I have graduated. It seems as if we still had a few more classes to attend. It just feels surreal. I think most of us miss attending classes, having discussions, preparing presentations together in the classroom and we feel that we should do this again.

Q3. You were selected as the valedictorian/salutatorian. What was your motivation/inspiration to be one of the best students?

Norbert: Actually, I didn't plan to be one of the best students. Instead, I had the plan to succeed at the maximum of my possibilities. It would be great if all the students could be called "best or valedictorian", but it seems that this is just an ideal wish. However, I think becoming one of the best students has been a result of my regular attitude, which is to focus as much as possible on everything I do. This is one of my core values and principles: work hard and try to maximize the quality of every work I do.

Hazirah: I believe my friends in ISUS and colleagues in Kuala Lumpur have helped me a lot during my studies. They provided the data and information I needed for presentations. Honestly speaking, my source of motivation was to watch concerts or musicals by the end of the month. "If I do well in this, I am going to watch a concert." It was more like a gift for myself that I could receive once I had fulfilledmy responsibilities as a student.

Q4. Could you share with us the most memorable experience in ISUS?

Norbert: This question seems to be difficult to answer because I have many good memorable experiences at ISUS, but particularly I cannot forget the Global Friend Night event during which many international students from different corners of the world and other invited people gathered to celebrate ISUS achievements and sharedother experiences and knowledge. Therefore, I recommend each student to take advantage of this opportunity at maximum. For everyone, there are many things to learn, to explore, and to benefit from depending on their preferences and ambitions.

Hazirah: Experience the journey, embrace the challenges, and enjoy your time. You need to enjoy the time you have in Seoul and make a lot of new friends. Of course, COVID-19 restricts freedom of movement, however, do not stop yourself from exploring. Make your time in Seoul valuable and make sure to eat a lot of Korean foods, enjoy the parks, go down walking along the Cheonggyecheon and if you're stressed, let everything out at noraebang. You will definitely miss your time in Seoul, so do not forget to take a lot of pictures and videos!

Nowadays, Indonesian students are increasingly choosing Korea to continue their education at all levels, from undergraduate to postgraduate to doctoral. In several rankings, such as the QS (Quacquarelli Symonds) version, which measures several parameters including academic reputation, number of publications and how many of these publications are cited, as well as the ratio of foreign students to teaching staff, Korean campuses rank highly with campuses in Singapore, Hong Kong, Japan, Malaysia, and Taiwan. Some of the reasons why Indonesian students choose Korea as their destination for further education include:

- 1. Quality that is comparable across campuses.
- 2. The high number of international students enrolled and the vast number of scholarships available. Indonesia and Korea should work together more closely.
- 3. An interest in Korean culture around the world (Hallyu).



Forestry/natural resources sciences, urban sciences, and environmental sciences are among the interests of Indonesian government universities in Korea, which are taught by various leading universities in Korea with alumni who have worked well in agencies, universities, NGOs, the private sector, and other fields. Despite the Covid-19 pandemic, Indonesian citizens are still interested in studying in Korea. Moreover, some major colleges in the fields of forestry/natural resources and environmental sciences concentrate on topics such as wood technology, sustainable and renewable energy, ecotourism, and other related topics.

The objective of the webinar was to inspire and refresh Indonesian human resources by increasing the RoK government's support for environmental and forestry cooperation through higher education programs at Korean universities. The information shared at this webinar provided practical knowledge for successful study and achievement in South Korea, in addition to inspiring potential applicants and scholarship recipients.

3. Seoullo 7017 where they got information about the successful regeneration project of Seoul Station Overpass





Municipal Solid Waste Management Policies, Practices, and Challenges in Ethiopia: A Systematic Review



Lemesa Hirpe WARI (MGLEP 6) and Professor Chunho Yeom published an article entitled "Municipal Solid Waste Management Policies, Practices, and Challenges in Ethiopia: A Systematic Review" through the Journal of Sustainability on 12 October, 2021. [Abstract]

Municipal Solid Waste Management (MSWM) affects several spheres, including environmental, social, and economic activities. In Ethiopia, massive waste generation and unbalanced management have worsened the issue. Hence, this systematic review investigates the Ethiopian MSWM policy and legal frameworks, practices, and challenges. The Scopus and Web of Science databases and Google Scholar were used to search published and unpublished studies from 2005 to 2021, and a website search was used to find studies from 1995 to 2021. The search was restricted to the English language, and the last search was conducted on 25 June 2021.

[Abstract]

The study was extracted from the characteristics of the developed study. A risk of bias assessment was conducted for the included studies using the AMSTAR 2. Among the 1135 identified records, 72 studies were found to be eligible. This systematic review identified numerous legal frameworks that enhance the implementation of MSWM in Ethiopia, which is mainly focused on waste collection, transportation, and disposal. Lack of policy enforcement, weak capacity, public awareness, and minimal cooperation among stakeholders were the main challenges. MSWM problems in Ethiopia have seen an increase in recent decades and are affecting daily life. Therefore, these findings may help to improve MSWM in Ethiopia.
